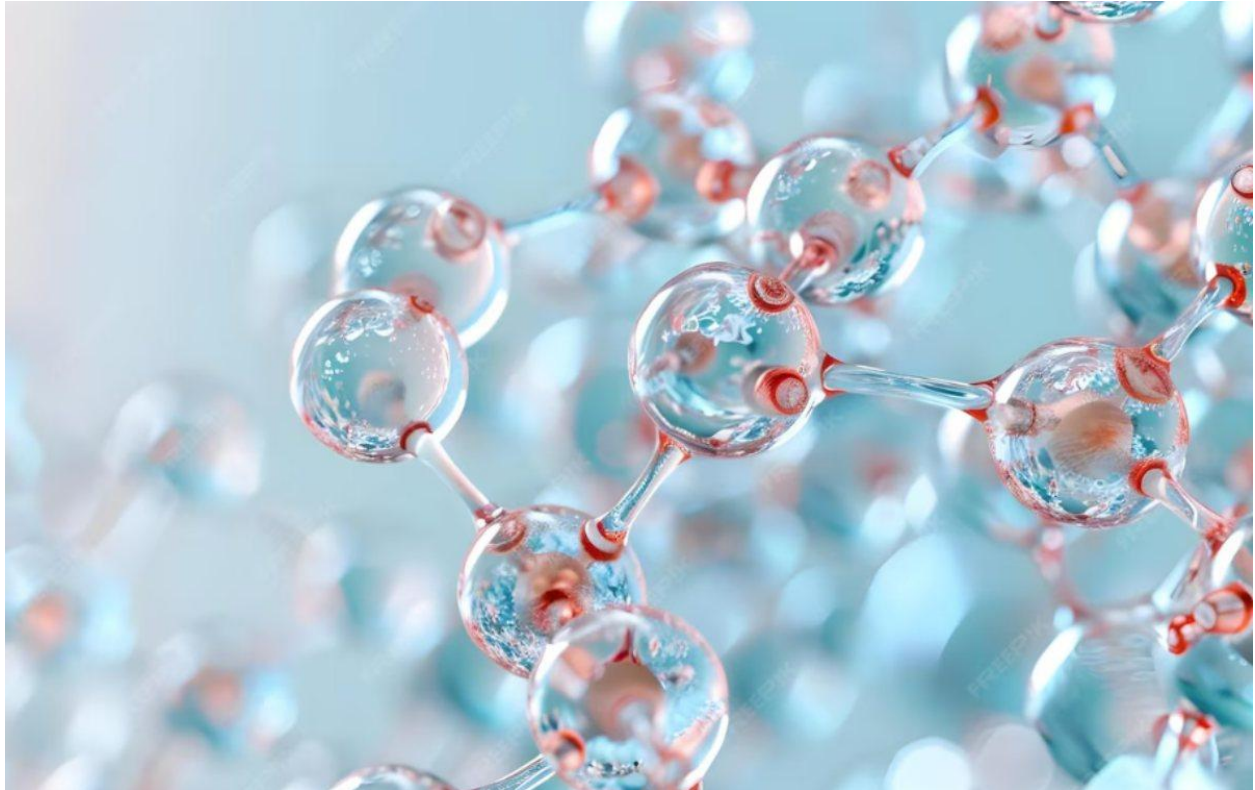
The Documentation That Actually Matters
